Christopher Kendall, Artistic Director The 20th Century Consort is an ensemble of professional musicians drawn from the symphonic, chamber, and solo concert worlds. It offers audiences an opportunity to hear standards as well as lesser known compositions, thus making an active contribution to the emergence of a larger and more permanent repertoire.

Lambert Orkis is a member of the 20th Century Consort and the Millennium Ensemble, and has made numerous appearances at Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, and the Kennedy Center. His extensive performances of music by living composers include world premieres by George Crumb, Richard Wernick, and Maurice Wright. Mr. Orkis is currently professor of piano at Temple University and also holds the position of Principal Pianist with the National Symphony.

Lucy Shelton has twice won the prestigious Naumburg Award. Her Carnegie Hall debut with the Pro Arte Chorale in Handel's *Israel in Egypt* and her world premieres as a member of the 20th Century Consort demonstrate the breadth of her repertoire. Ms. Shelton has appeared with the Los Angeles and St. Paul Chamber Orchestras and has participated in the Aspen and Marlboro Music Festivals and at Spoleto USA. She records for Vox, Vanguard, Grenadilla, Sonory, and the Smithsonian Collection of Recordings.

The Emerson String Quartet

Formed six years ago, the Emerson String Quartet has risen to a position of eminence among the world's great string quartets. Since winning the Naumberg Award for Chamber Music in 1978, the group has appeared on virtually every major concert series in the United States and Canada. In its fourth season of residency here at the Smithsonian, the Quartet was recently named resident quartet with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, adding that credit to an already impressive list of accomplishments, including affiliations with the Spoleto Festivals, both here and in Italy, Middlebury College, in a joint project with scholar H. C. Robbins Landon, and the University of Hartford's Hart School of Music.

In Spring of 1983, the Emerson String Quartet will embark on its first major European tour, anticipation for which is so great that a second tour is already being planned for the following season.
